FABRIZIO BARCA, *Economic Advisor to the Treasury Minister, Rome, Italy*

Fabrizio Barca is an economic advisor to the Italian Treasury and president of the OECD's Territorial Policies Committee. At the Treasury, he is in charge of implementing new rules for the governance of territorial policies. His background includes working as a researcher and division chief in the Bank of Italy's Research Department, where he authored articles and books on industrial policy, corporate finance, firm surveys, and economic history. In addition to serving on several policy committees, Mr. Barca has also taught at the Universities of Bocconi-Milan, Siena, Modena, and Rome.

ALAN D. BARKEMA, *Vice President, Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City*

Alan D. Barkema is a vice president and economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. Mr. Barkema joined the bank as an economist in the Economic Research Department in 1986. He served a three-year term as professor and head of the Agricultural Economics Department at Oklahoma State University before returning to the Bank in the summer of 1999. His research has explored the impact of national and international developments on the agricultural and rural economies as well as a broad range of issues spanning the food industry, international trade, and agricultural finance and policy.

BRIAN DABSON, *President, Corporation for Enterprise Development, Washington, D.C.*

Since 1992, Brian Dabson has been president at the Corporation for Enterprise Development (CFED), a national nonprofit organization with a mission to foster widely shared and sustainable economic well being. His work experience includes nine years as managing director of CEI Consultants Ltd., a European consulting and research organization, and 13 years in local government work in England and Scotland. Mr. Dabson is an experienced facilitator of community and organizational strategic planning processes, and is a frequent speaker and writer on economic development issues. He currently serves as president of the OECD Forum on Social Innovations, a member of the editorial board for the Economic Development Digest, a member of the National Board of REAL Enterprises, Inc., and a fellow of the Institute for the Regional Community.

MARK DRABENSTOTT, *Vice President and Director, Center for the Study of Rural America, Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City*

Mark Drabenstott is vice president and director of the Center for the Study of Rural America. He is the chair of the National Planning Association's Food and Agriculture Committee and is director of the National Bureau of Economic Research at Harvard University. He is the author of more than 100 articles on topics such as farm policy, agricultural trade, rural and economic development, and the food industry. Mr. Drabenstott is a frequent speaker before industry, university, and public policy audiences throughout the nation. On

more than ten occasions, he has testified before Congress on rural and agricultural policy issues, while also advising the World Bank and other international organizations.

THOMAS M. HOENIG, *President, Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City*

Thomas M. Hoenig is president and chief executive officer of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City and a member of the Federal Open Market Committee. He joined the bank in 1973 as an economist and assumed the role of president in October 1991. He directs Federal Reserve activities in the seven-state Tenth Federal Reserve District—an area that includes Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Wyoming, northern New Mexico, and western Missouri. President Hoenig is a member of the board of directors for the University of Missouri-Kansas City and serves on the board of trustees for Benedictine College, Atchison, Kansas. He is a member of the board of trustees of Midwest Research Institute and is a member of the banking advisory boards at the University of Missouri-Kansas City and the University of Missouri-Columbia.

STANLEY JOHNSON, *Vice Provost for Extension, Iowa State University*

Stanley Johnson is vice provost for extension and Charles F. Curtiss Distinguished Professor, Department of Economics, Iowa State University (ISU). As vice provost, Professor Johnson has managed a major restructuring of extension at the university, including the organization of a state-wide association of elected county extension councils, new budgeting and financial planning systems for county and area offices, and a projects approach to program management and accountability. Before he assumed his current position, he was the director for the Center for Agricultural and Rural Development at ISU—an internationally recognized multidisciplinary public policy research center. He has authored or edited ten books, published more than 150 refereed articles, and authored numerous book chapters, technical papers, and government reports. He is a fellow of the American Agricultural Economics Association, Foreign Member of the Former Soviet Union Academy of Agricultural Sciences, the Russian Academy of Agricultural Science, the Ukraine Academy of Science, and the Hungarian Academy of Sciences.

EDWARD J. MALECKI, *Professor of Geography and Director of the Center for Urban and Regional Analysis, The Ohio State University*

Edward J. Malecki is professor of geography and director of the Center for Urban and Regional Analysis at The Ohio State University. He was professor of geography of the Department of Geography at the University of Florida from 1983 to 2001, serving as department chair from 1988 to 1995. Before joining the University of Florida in 1983, he was on the faculty at the University of Oklahoma, Norman, where he was also a Research Fellow in the Science and Public Policy Program. Professor Malecki also was a visiting researcher in the Centre for Urban and Regional Development Studies at the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Newcastle, England, in 1982 and was a Fulbright Fellow at the University of Economics and Business Administration in Vienna, Austria, from 1993 to 1994. In addition to lecturing in several countries throughout Europe, Asia, and North America, he has authored or co-authored 40 book chapters and over 75 journals articles, as well as the book, *Technology and Economic Development: The Dynamics of Local, Regional and National Competitiveness*. He currently serves on the editorial advisory boards of several international journals and is associate editor of *Entrepreneurship and Regional Development*.

DEBORAH M. MARKLEY, *Principal, Policy Research Group, Chapel Hill, North Carolina*

Deborah M. Markley is principal of Policy Research Group, a Chapel Hill, North Carolina consulting firm specializing in economic development research and policy analysis. Her research has included analysis of innovative nontraditional venture capital programs, evaluation of state industrial extension programs, and consideration of the impacts of changing banking markets on small business finance. Her research has been presented in academic journals, as well as to national public policy organizations. She has held faculty positions at the University of Tennessee and the University of Massachusetts, and she currently chairs the Rural Policy Research Institute's Rural Equity Capital Initiative.

LARRY MARTIN, *Chief Executive Officer, George Morris Centre, University of Guelph, Ontario, Canada*

Larry Martin is the chief executive officer of the George Morris Centre. The Centre's role is to provide private and public decisionmakers with the information and analysis they require on current and long-term issues that affect the agri-food sector. The Centre assists those in the agri-food sector who are adjusting to, or proactively leading, change. Prior to joining the Centre in 1990, he worked at the University of Guelph's Department of Agricultural Economics and Business for 18 years. He joined the university in 1972 as a faculty member and assumed greater responsibilities as associate professor and professor until being named department chair in 1986. In his work at the George Morris Centre he has helped a number of agri-food businesses develop strategic, business, and financial plans. He is currently president of the Canadian Agricultural Economics Association and serves as a board member for Ridley, Inc. and Cold Springs Farm. In addition to being an invited speaker at international conferences and serving as an expert witness in several trade disputes, he has authored or co-authored a number of research papers and reports.

LARRY G. MEEKER, *Vice President, Consumer and Community Affairs Departments, Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City*

Larry G. Meeker is vice president of the Consumer and Community Affairs Departments at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. He is responsible for the consumer compliance examinations of state member banks, including enforcement of the fair lending laws and the Community Reinvestment Act. He is also responsible for the bank's informational and educational initiatives that support community economic development and fair and impartial access to credit. Mr. Meeker has had various assignments over the years at the Federal Reserve, including supervision of problem banks and bank holding companies, supervision of commercial compliance examinations, discount officer, and supervision of banking related research activities. He has published widely in academic and professional journals. His research topics have ranged from community development lending and the profitability of CRA lending, to valuing closely held bank stocks, payments transfer risks, and the effects of inflation on bank capital and earnings.

MARIO PEZZINI, *Head of the Rural and Regional Development Programme, Territorial Development Service, OECD, Paris, France*

Mario Pezzini is the head of the OECD's Rural and Regional Development Programme. His primary fields of interest include regional, industrial, and labor economics. His background includes working as a senior economist at Nomisma Spa (an economic research organization) in Bologna, Italy; economic counselor in regional planning and development for the Regional Government of Emilia-Romagna; and professor of industrial economics in Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Mines de Paris.

STUART A. ROSENFELD, *President, Regional Technology Strategies, Inc., Carrboro, North Carolina*

Stuart A. Rosenfeld is founder and president of Regional Technology Strategies, Inc. in Carrboro, North Carolina. His recent experience includes serving as deputy director of the Southern Growth Policies Board, founding and directing the Southern Technology Council, and forming and managing the Trans-Atlantic Technology and Training Alliance. Before joining Southern Growth, he co-authored a national assessment of vocational education for the U.S. Congress. His work experience also includes directing a private elementary school in Vermont and ten years as a manufacturing engineer and director of manufacturing education and management science sections at the General Electric Company. He has published more than 100 books and articles and consulted or testified on numerous occasions before the U.S. Congress, National Academy of Sciences, and the OECD.

KARL STAUBER, *President, Northwest Area Foundation, St. Paul, Minnesota*

Karl Stauber is president of the Northwest Area Foundation. He is responsible for all aspects of the foundation, including oversight of the foundation's distribution of approximately \$20 million per year to help communities reduce poverty in the eight states of the Pacific Northwest and the Northern Great Plains. Prior to becoming the Foundation's fourth president, he served as senior appointee in the Clinton Administration at the USDA in Washington, D.C. While at the USDA, his work focused on the 1996 Farm Bill, refocusing federal agricultural research and education policy, and the community development portion of the Northwest Timber Initiative. From 1986 to 1993, he was a vice president of the foundation, with responsibility for developing new approaches to economic development, focusing on rural and other low-income communities. In addition to other leadership responsibilities, he volunteers as secretary and member of the board of Community Loan Technologies and is a member of the board of directors of the Minneapolis Foundation.

RICHARD WAKEFORD, *Chief Executive, The Countryside Agency, London, United Kingdom*

Since the formation of the Countryside Agency in April 1999, Richard Wakeford has been its chief executive. Mr. Wakeford served as chief executive of the Countryside Commission from 1996 to 1999. His work experience includes dealing with cross-departmental issues related to economic and environmental affairs in the Cabinet Office Economic and Domestic Affairs Secretariat and implementing a plan-led system and developing planning policies as head of Development Plans and Policies in the Department of the Environment. Mr. Wakeford also edited the land use and transport chapters of the UK Sustainable Development Strategy,

building on his earlier work on the team which prepared the country's first Environment White Paper, "This Common Inheritance." He is a member of the UK Sustainable Development Commission and a fellow of the Royal Society for Arts and Commerce.
