

Proposal: Pre-Filing Eviction Mediation Pilot

The Mediation Center of Lincoln



Challenges Identified



1,309 children were evicted in Lincoln in 2023.



In the second half of 2024, 20-30% of bookings in the Lancaster County Jail were for individuals with no home address.



The average eviction costs a landlord about \$3,000 in legal costs and turnover expenses, leading to higher housing costs downstream.

Proposed Solution

A pilot program that integrates and expands existing mediation infrastructure to connect landlords and tenants to mediation services before evictions are filed.

Expected Impact



Landlords often get paid back rent and save legal costs.



Tenants typically stay in their homes longer and have better living conditions.



The county can save money when the volume of court cases drops.



Businesses may experience fewer employee absences and less turnover.



Neighborhoods thrive when residents put down roots.



Schools may save resources when fewer students move throughout the year.



That's the agreement rate for pre-filing mediation cases at the St. Louis Conflict Resolution Center.

With a \$75,000 investment over two years, we can...



- Train 25-30 additional mediators to expand mediation capacity
- Fund the position of a part-time staff coordinator for program management
- Employ a robust communication strategy to promote mediation as an alternative to eviction proceedings among landlords, tenants, and agencies
- Conduct a thorough study on the program's impact on courts, government, and the housing system
- Use findings to assess the program's effectiveness and potential for broader implementation





Need: Nebraska has lost 10% of its childcare programs since the COVID-19 pandemic.




