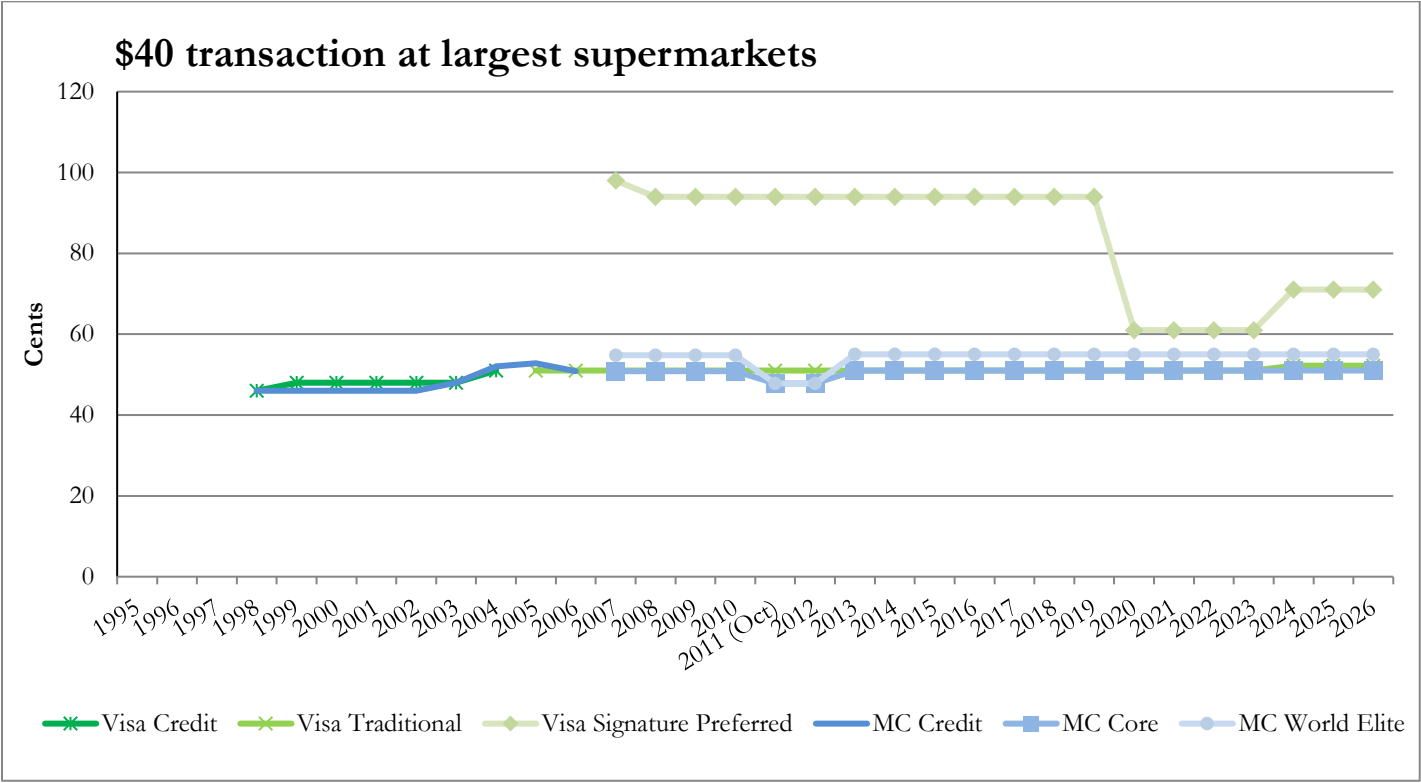
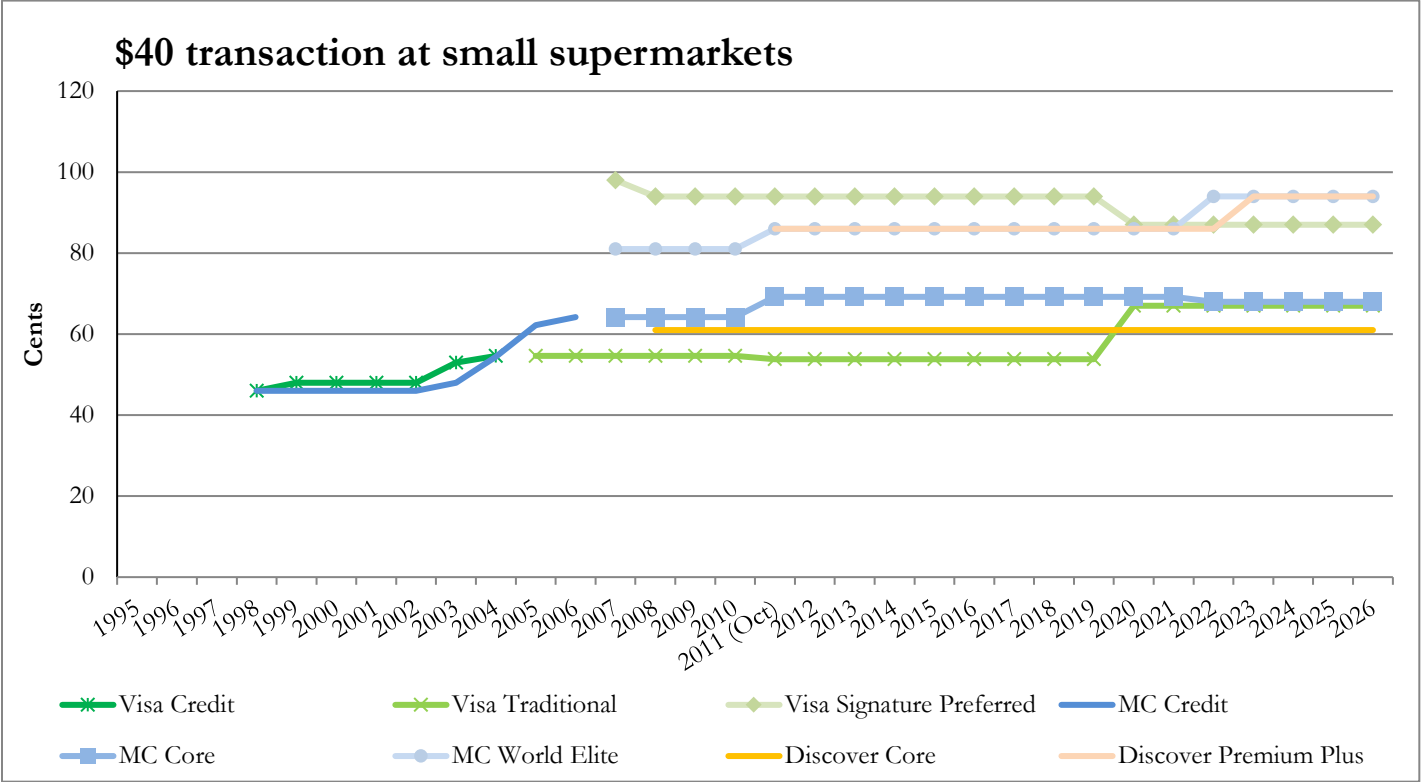

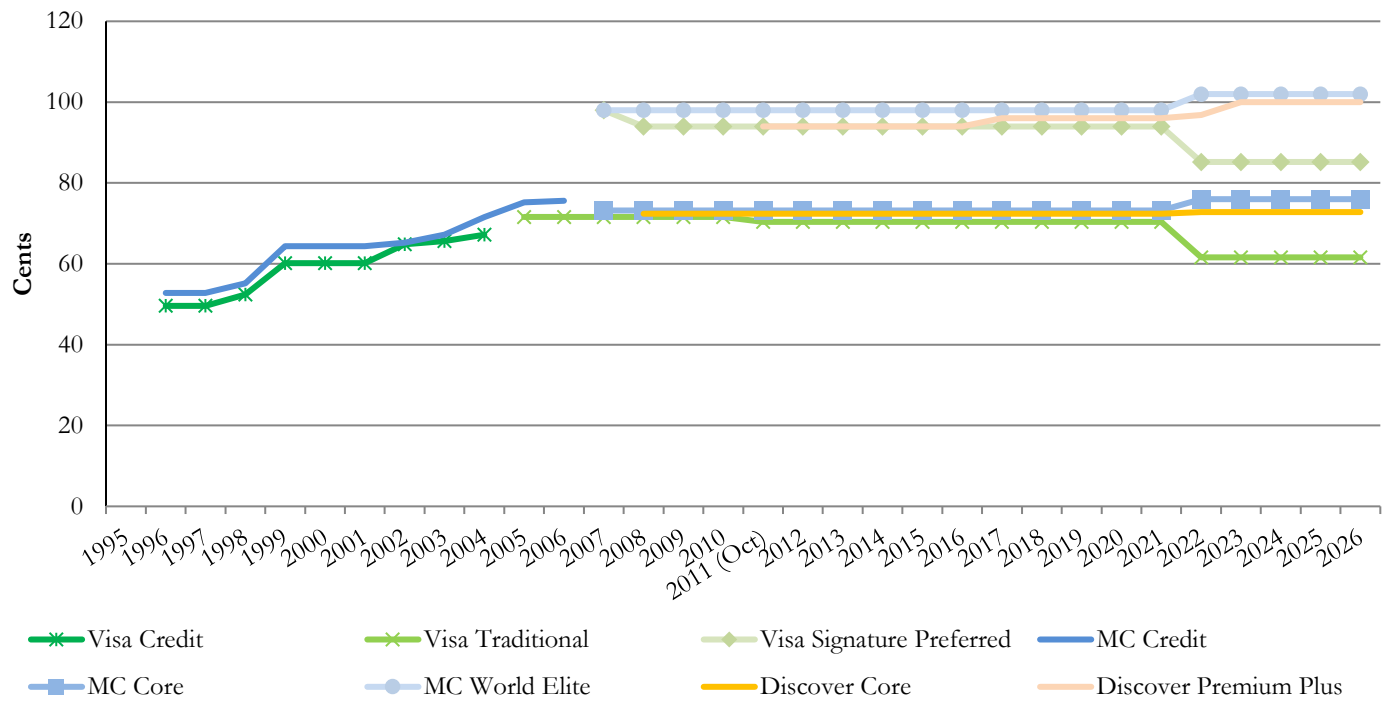
[‡] This update includes regular and “premium issuer” interchange fees for different merchant categories and sizes. In 2010 or after, several PIN-debit networks introduced the “premium issuer” fees, which are assessed on transactions where the cards belong to qualifying issuers that typically commit to a specific level of transaction volume on a given network. Fees shown in this document as assessed to merchants are from individual networks’ fee schedules and may not necessarily represent interchange fee revenue issuers earn. Some networks also offer lower interchange fees than represented in the fee schedule to some (large) merchants.

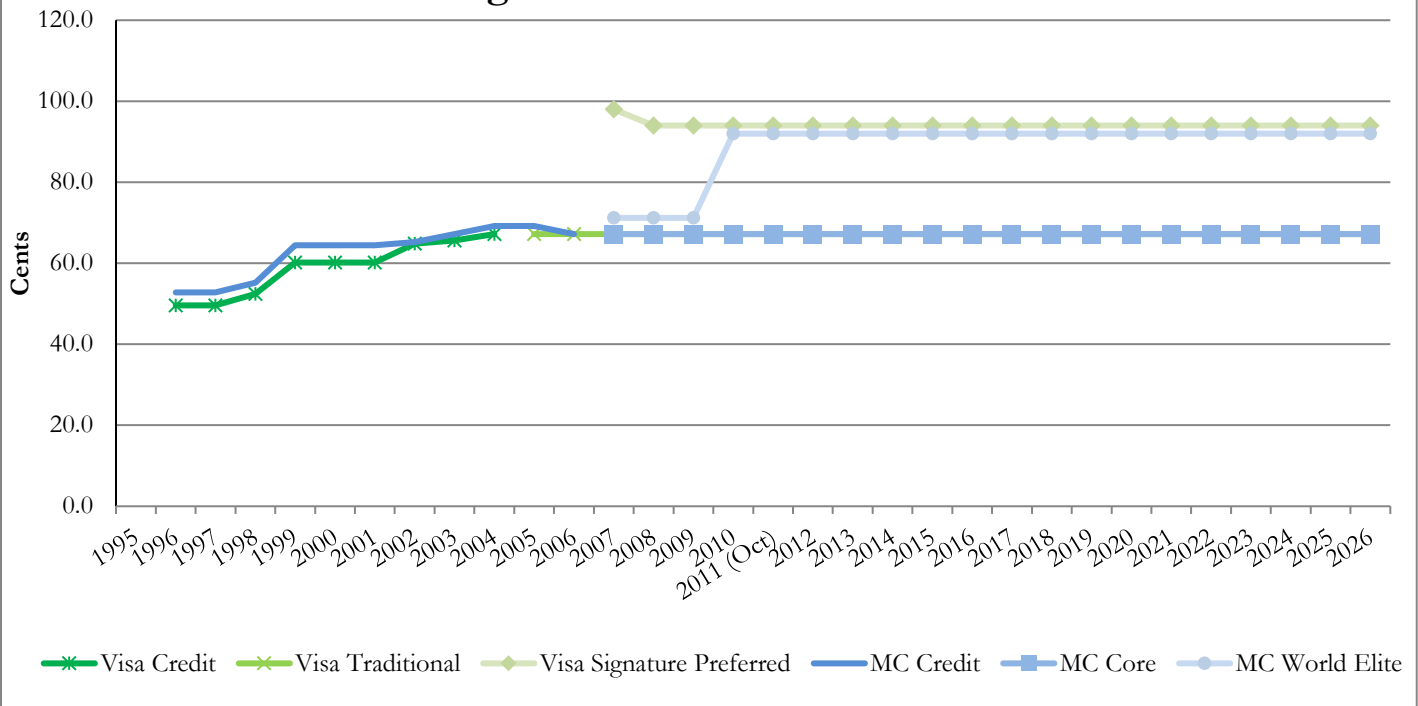

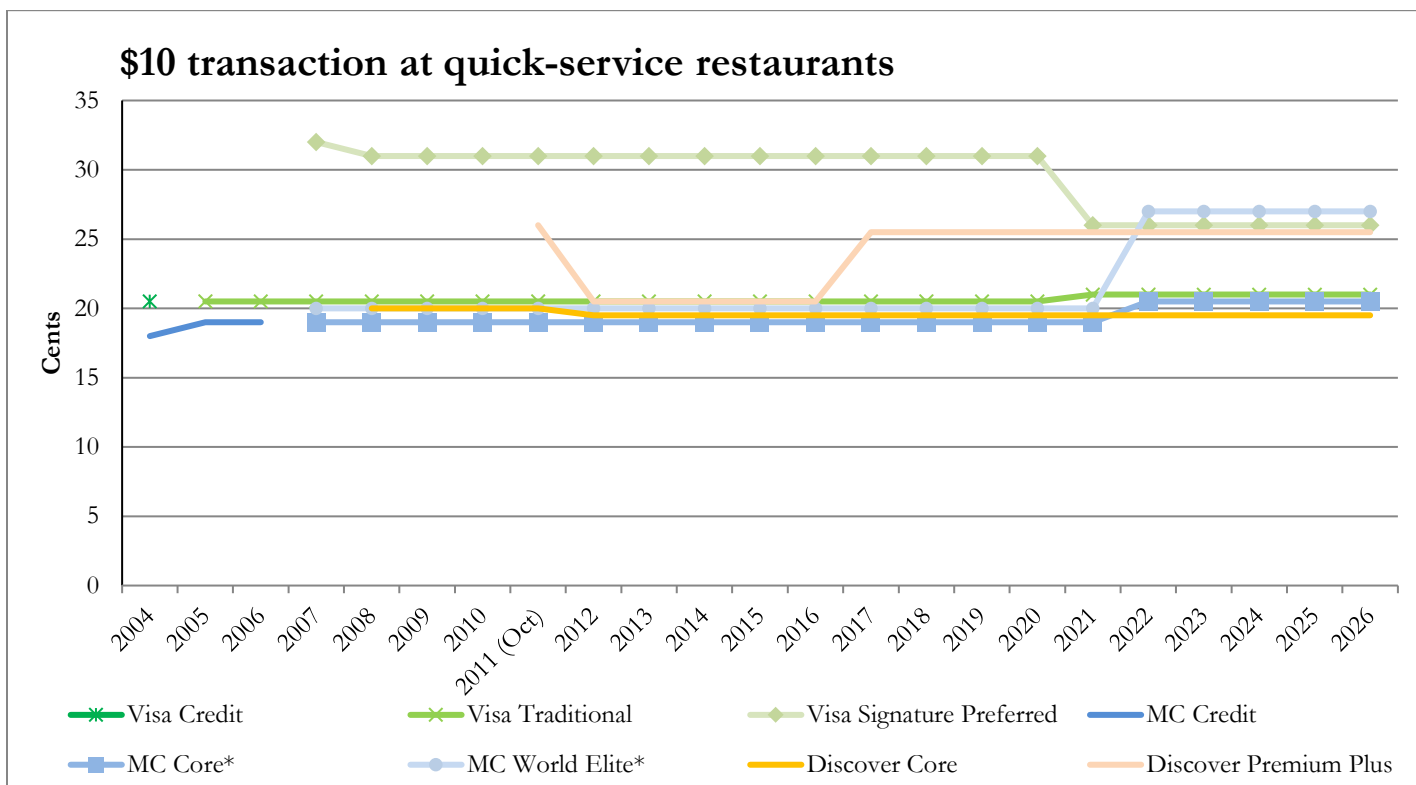
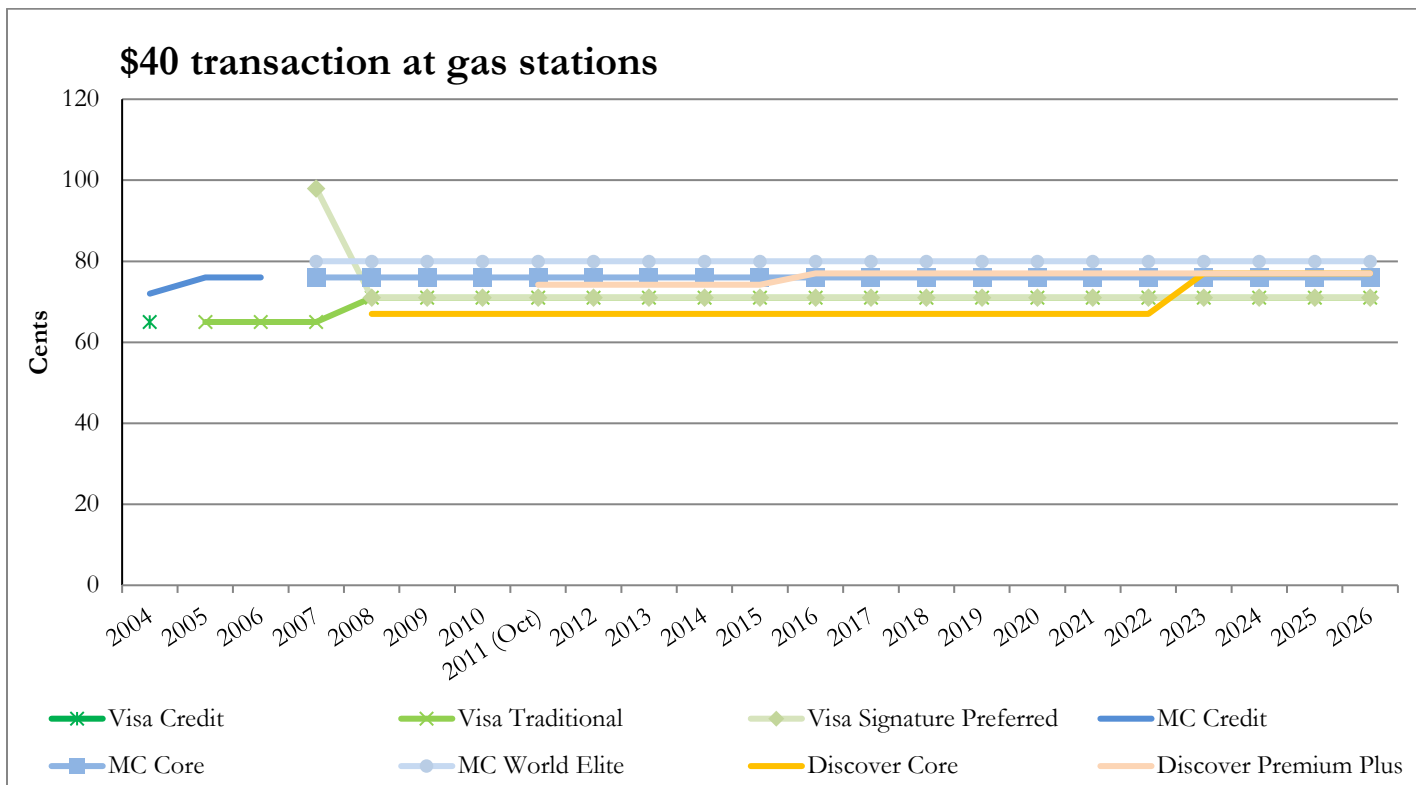


\$40 transaction at small retailers



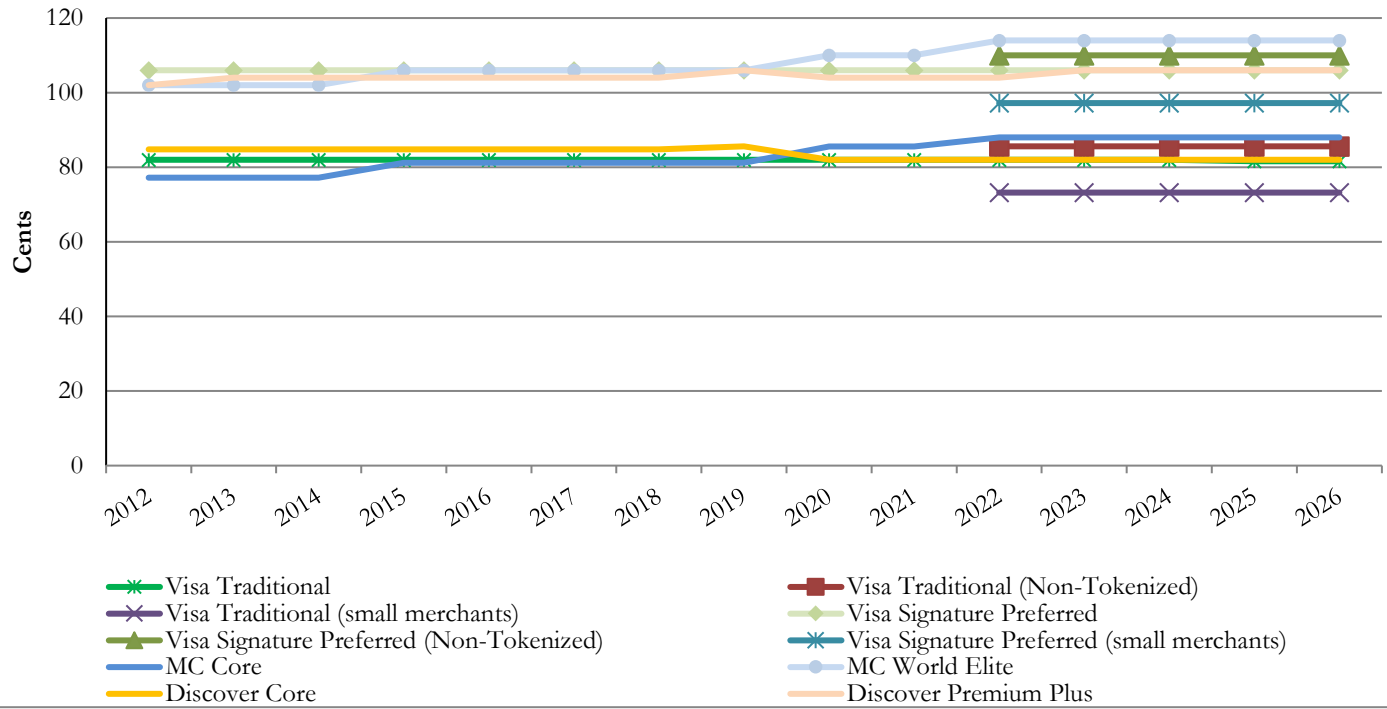
\$40 transaction at largest retailers



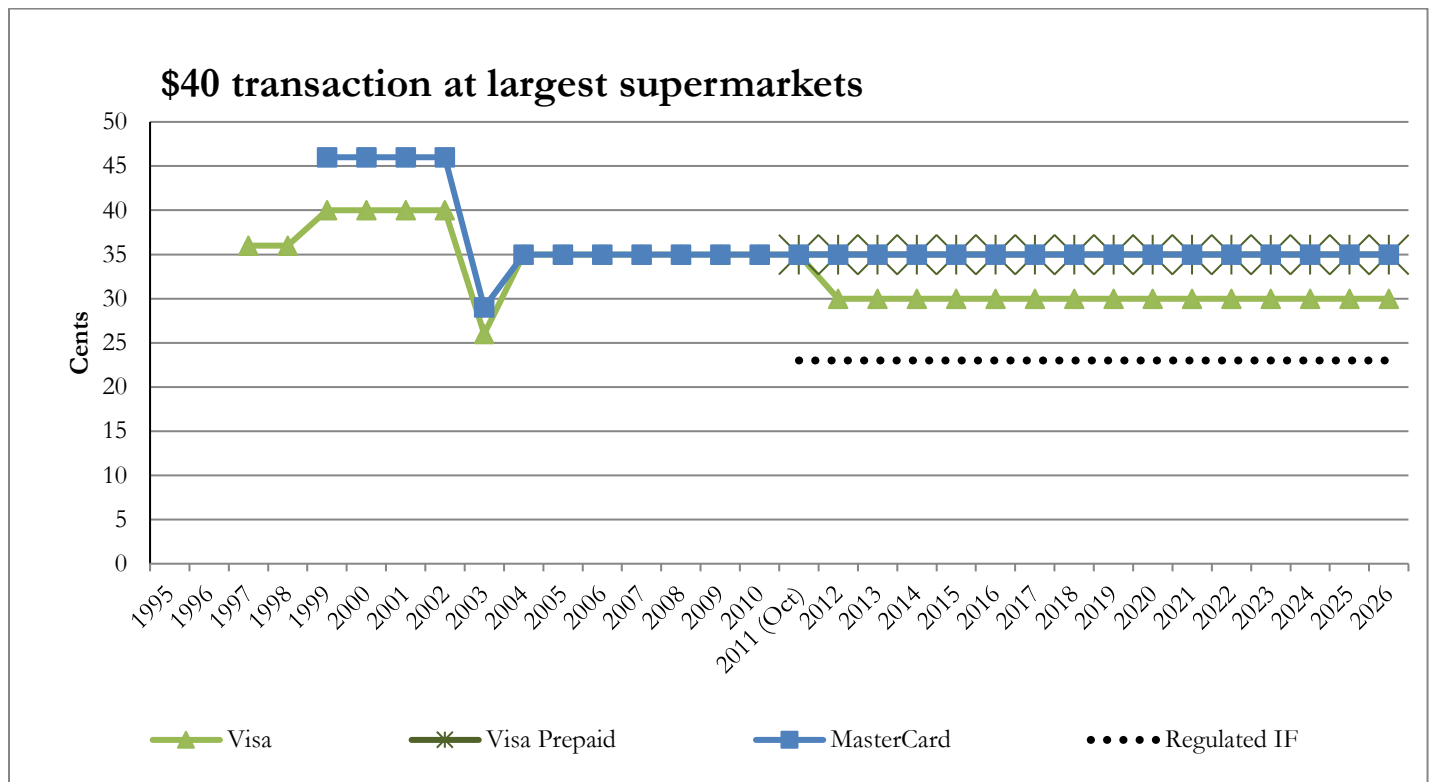
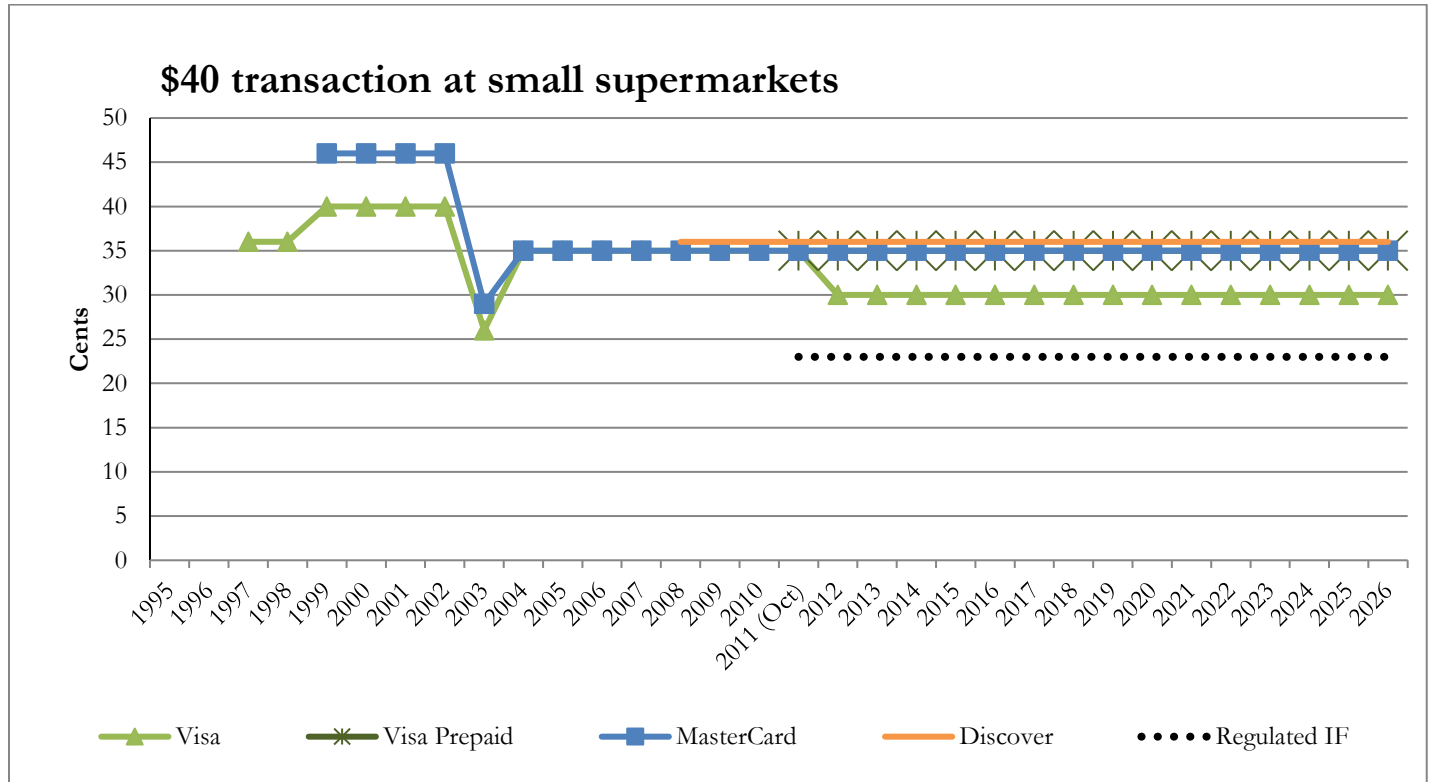

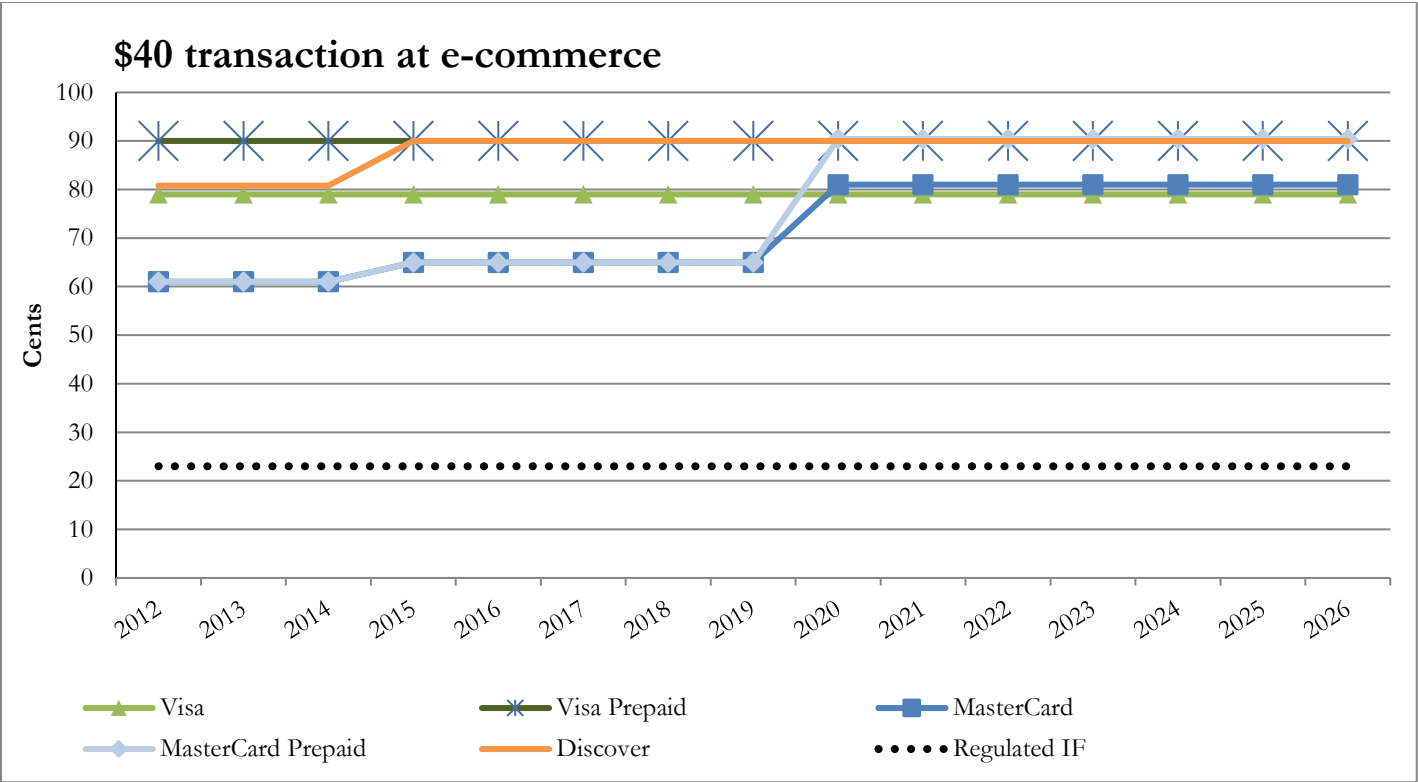

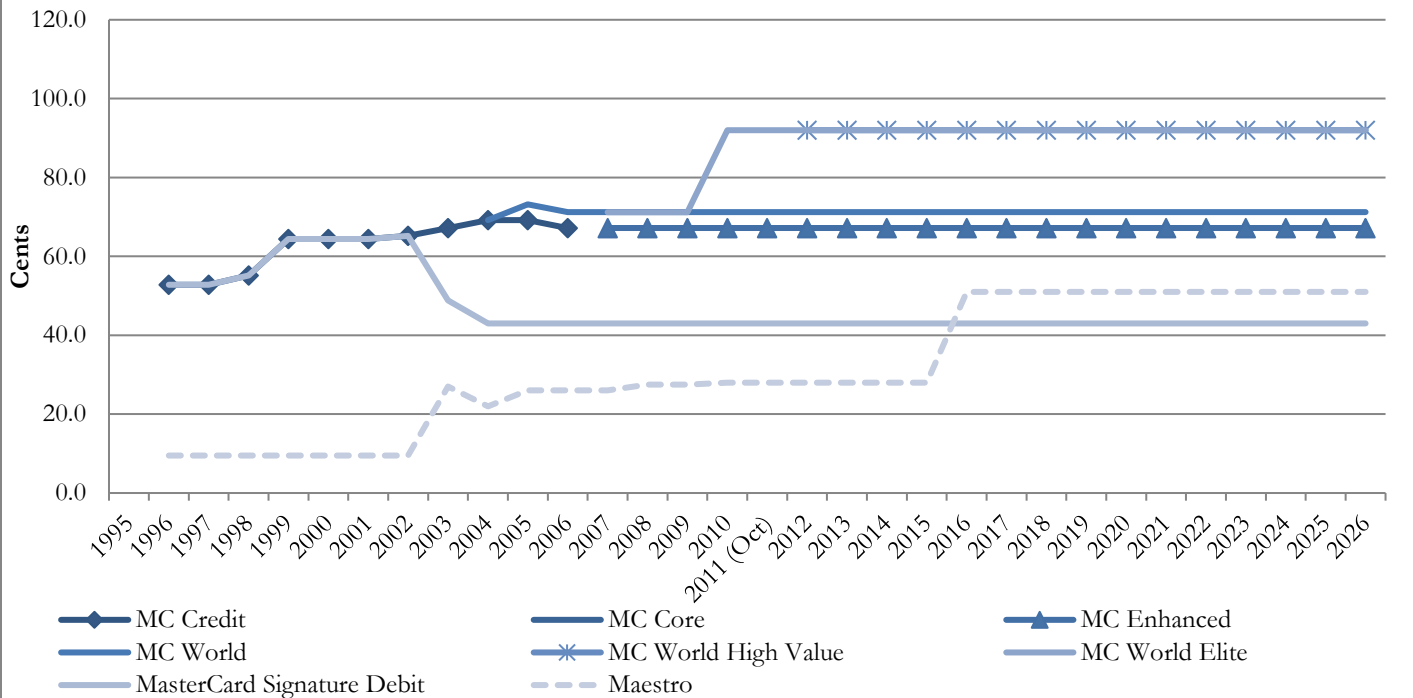

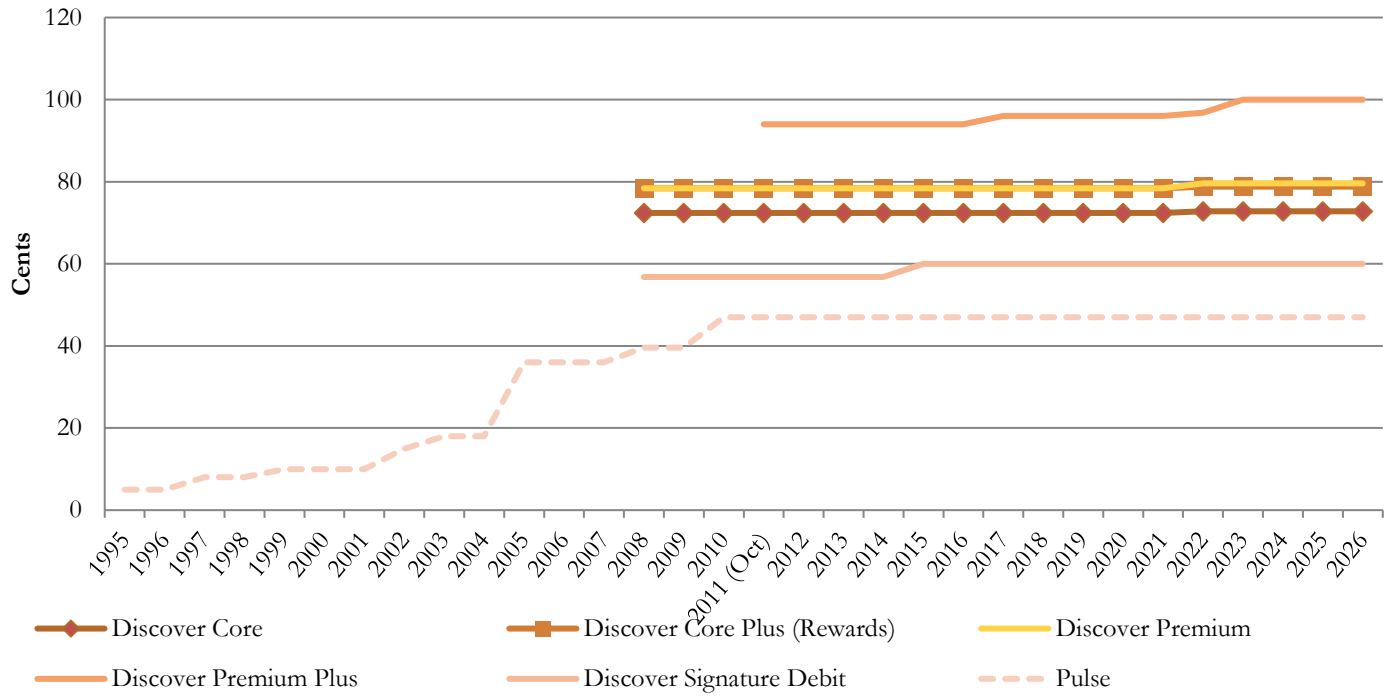
\$40 MasterCard transaction at small retailers



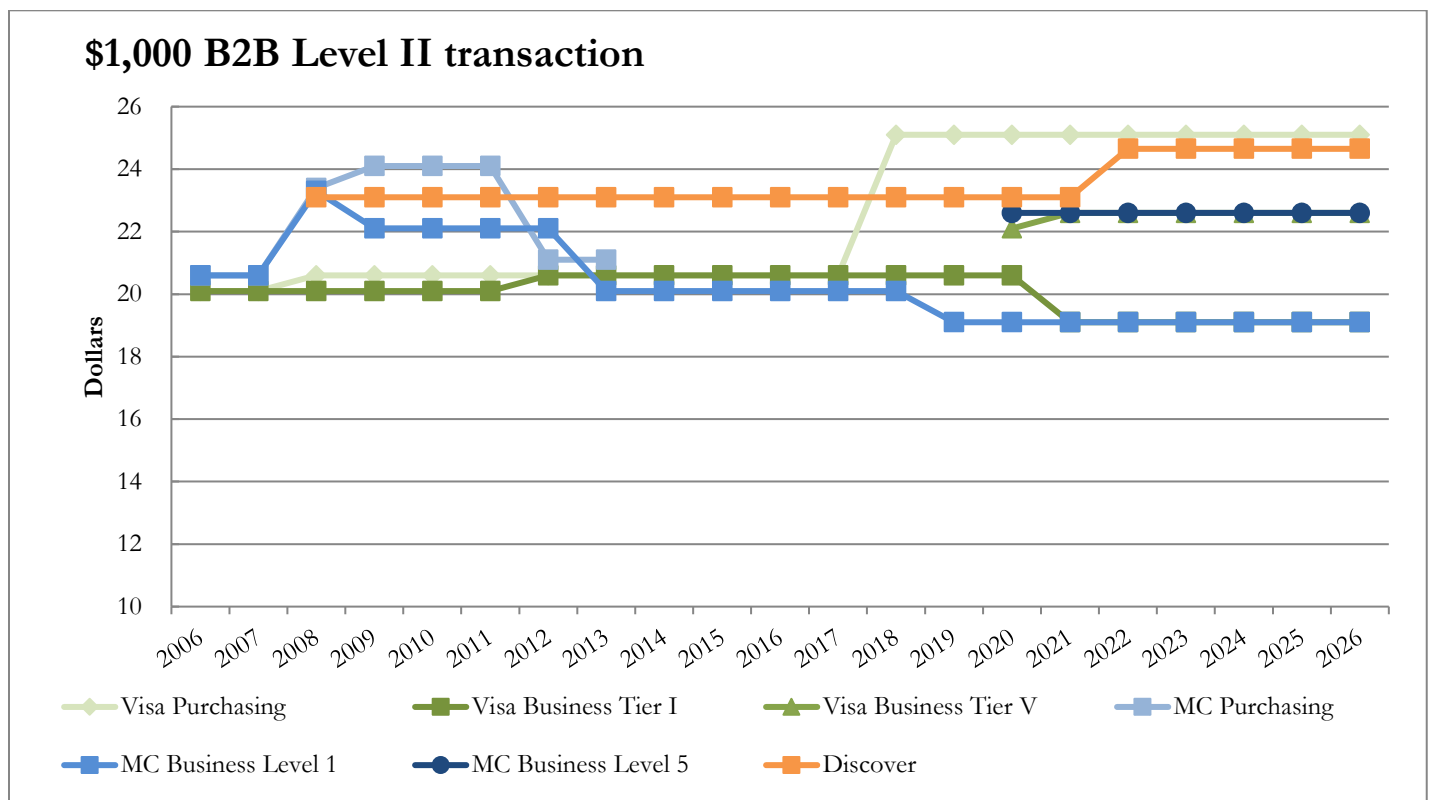
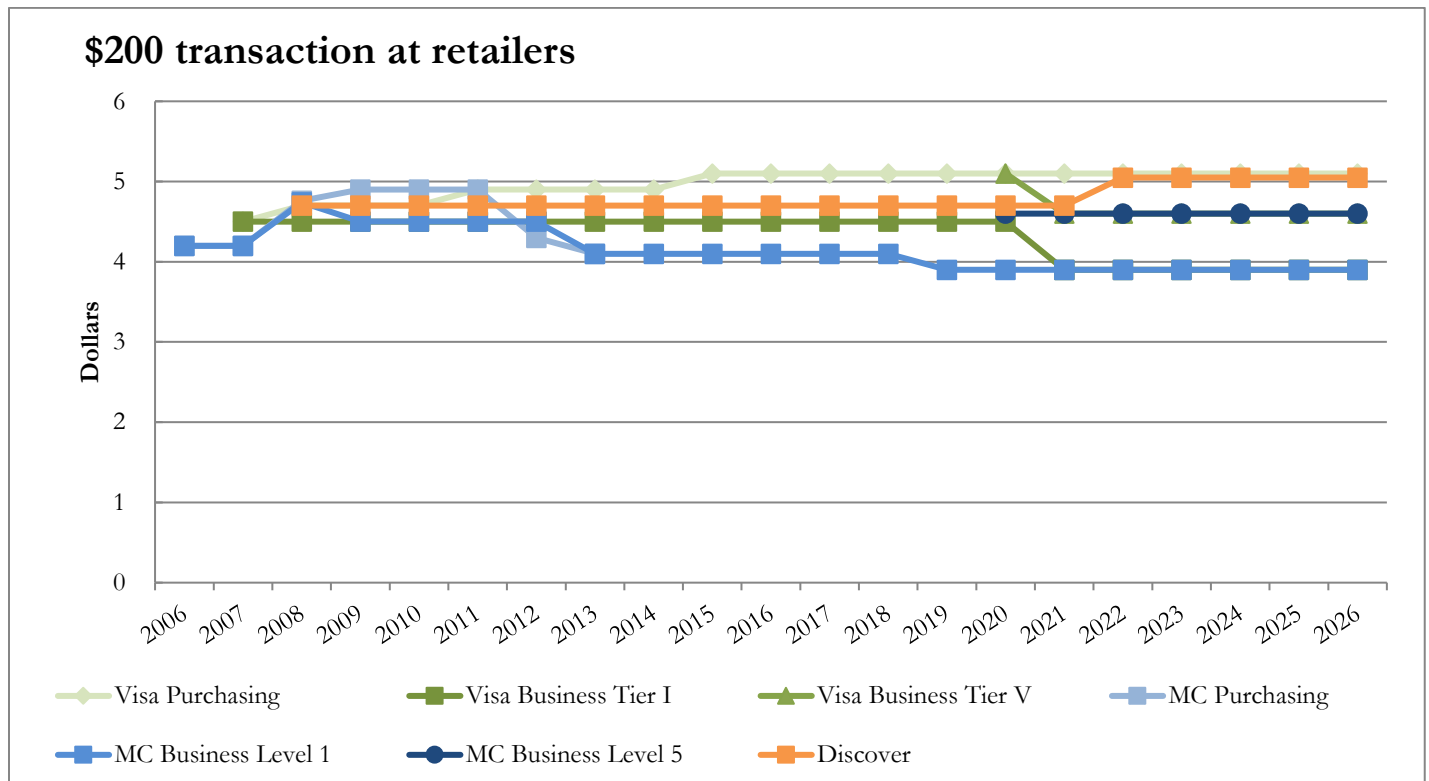
\$40 MasterCard transaction at largest retailers



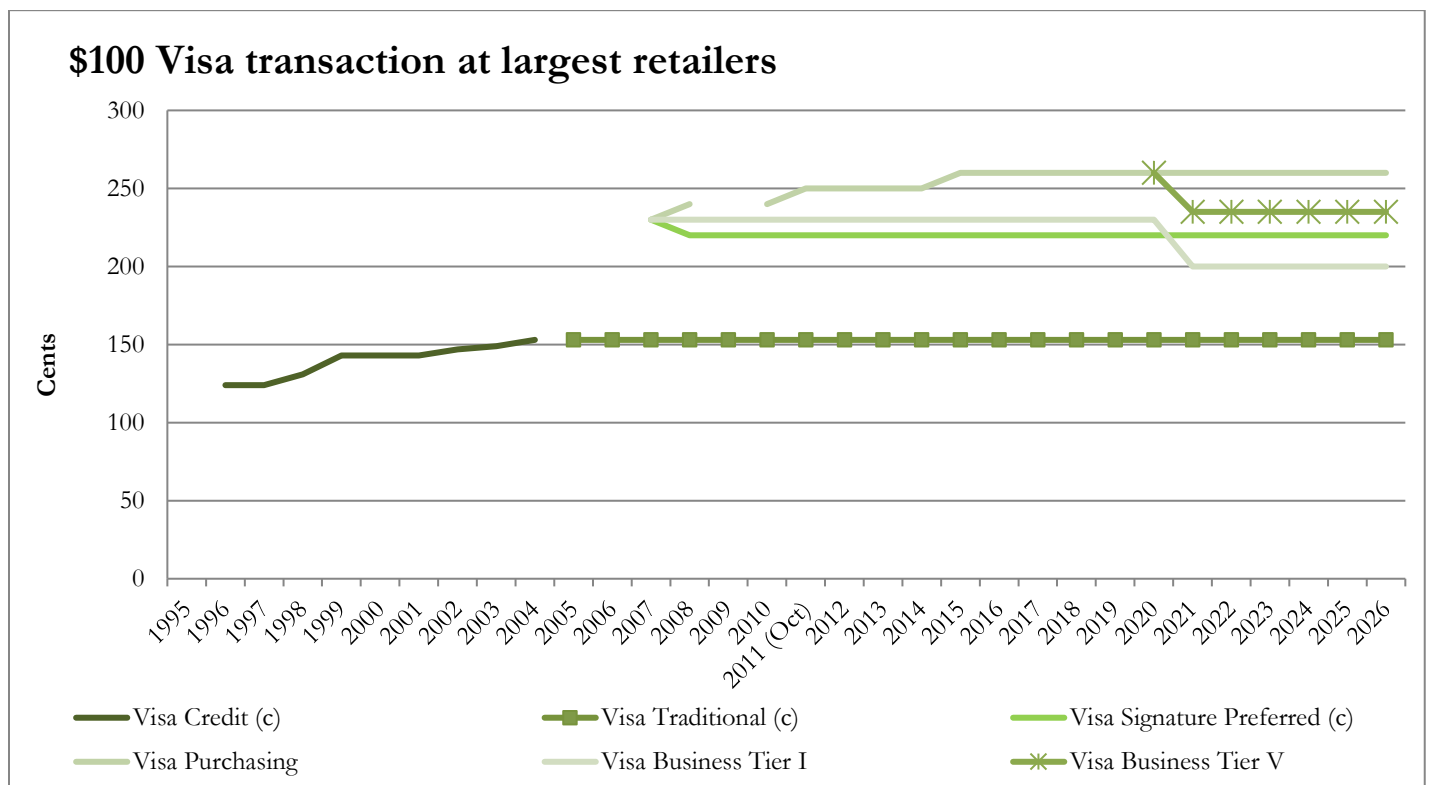
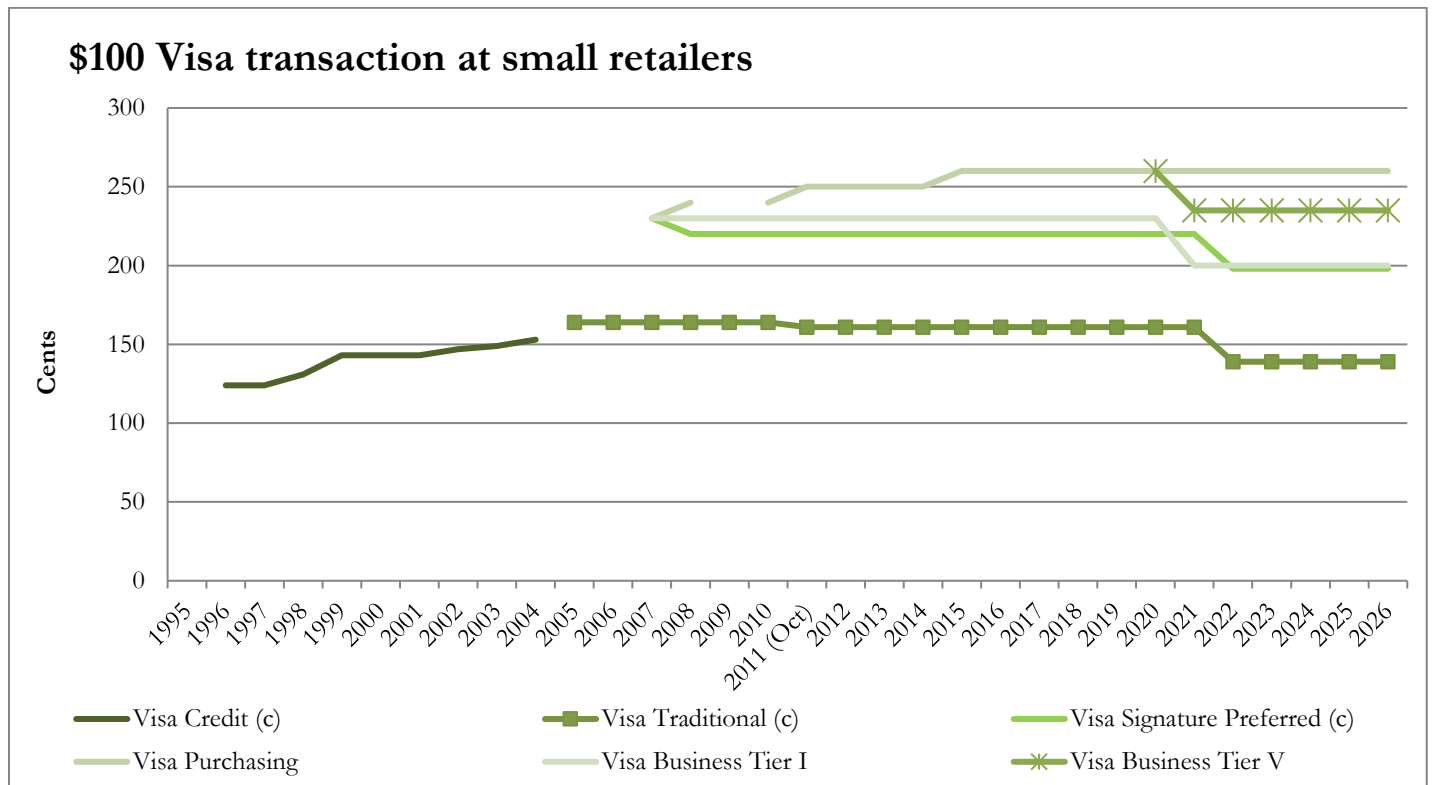
\$40 Discover transaction at small retailers

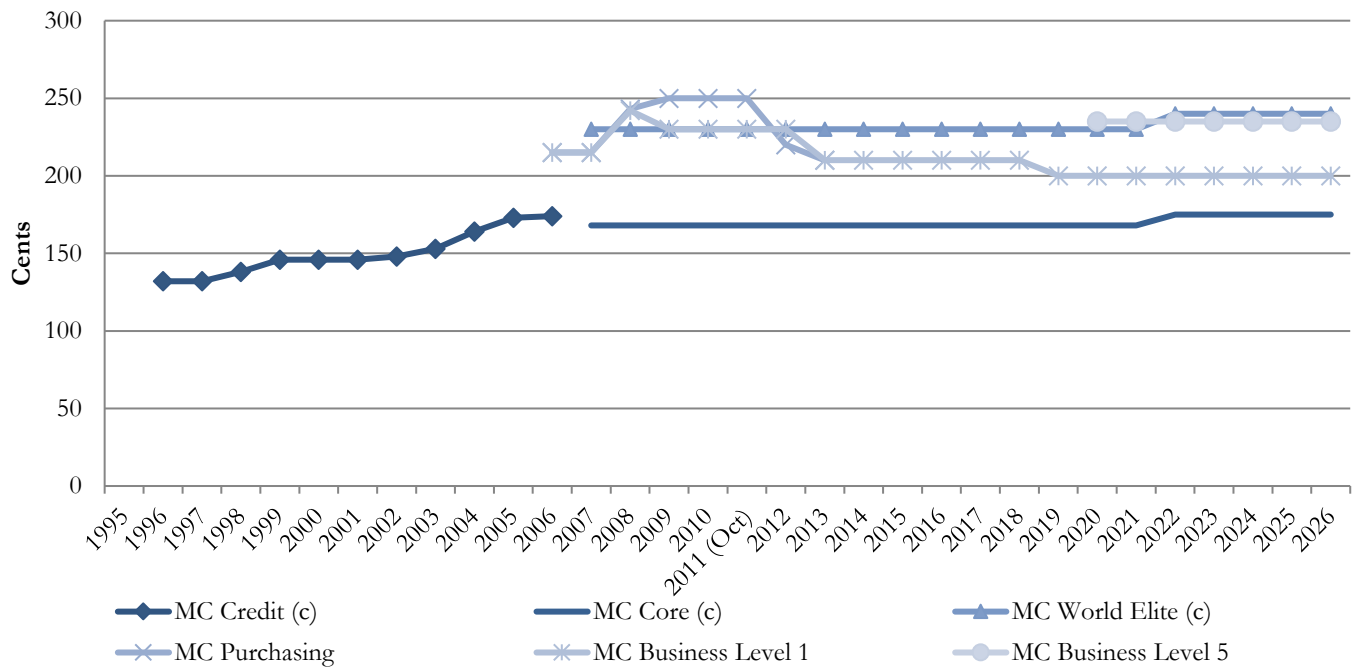

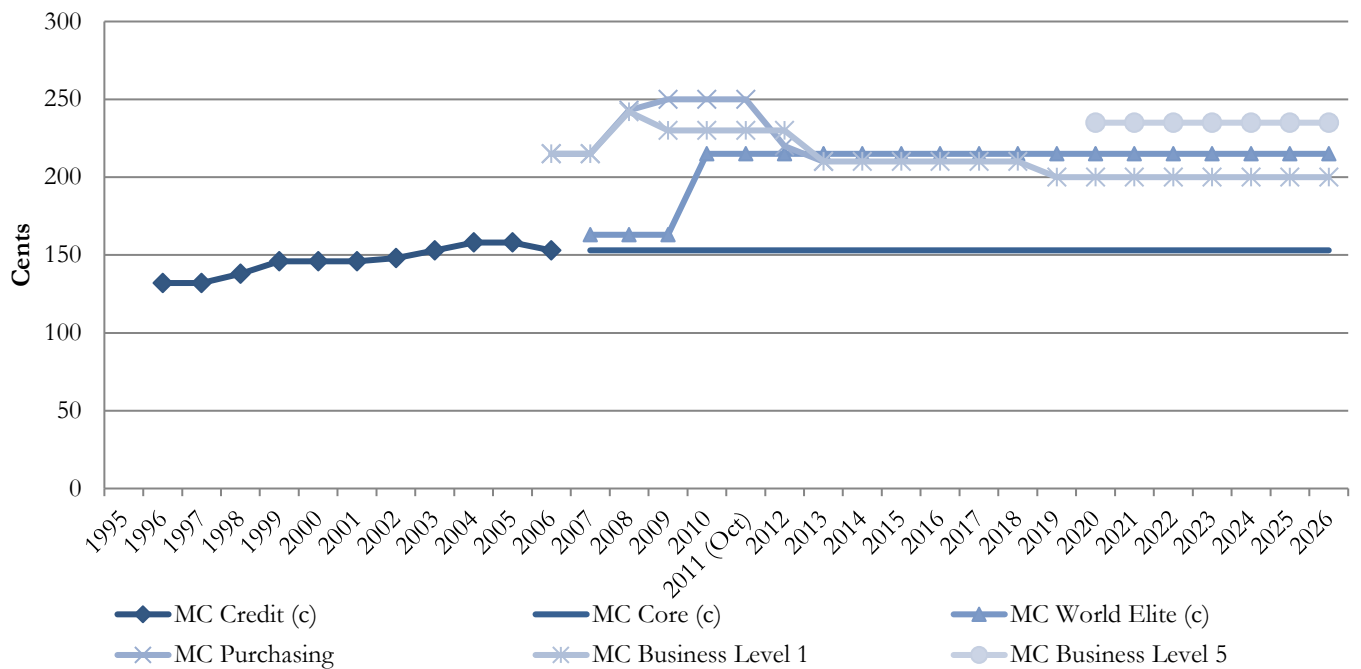

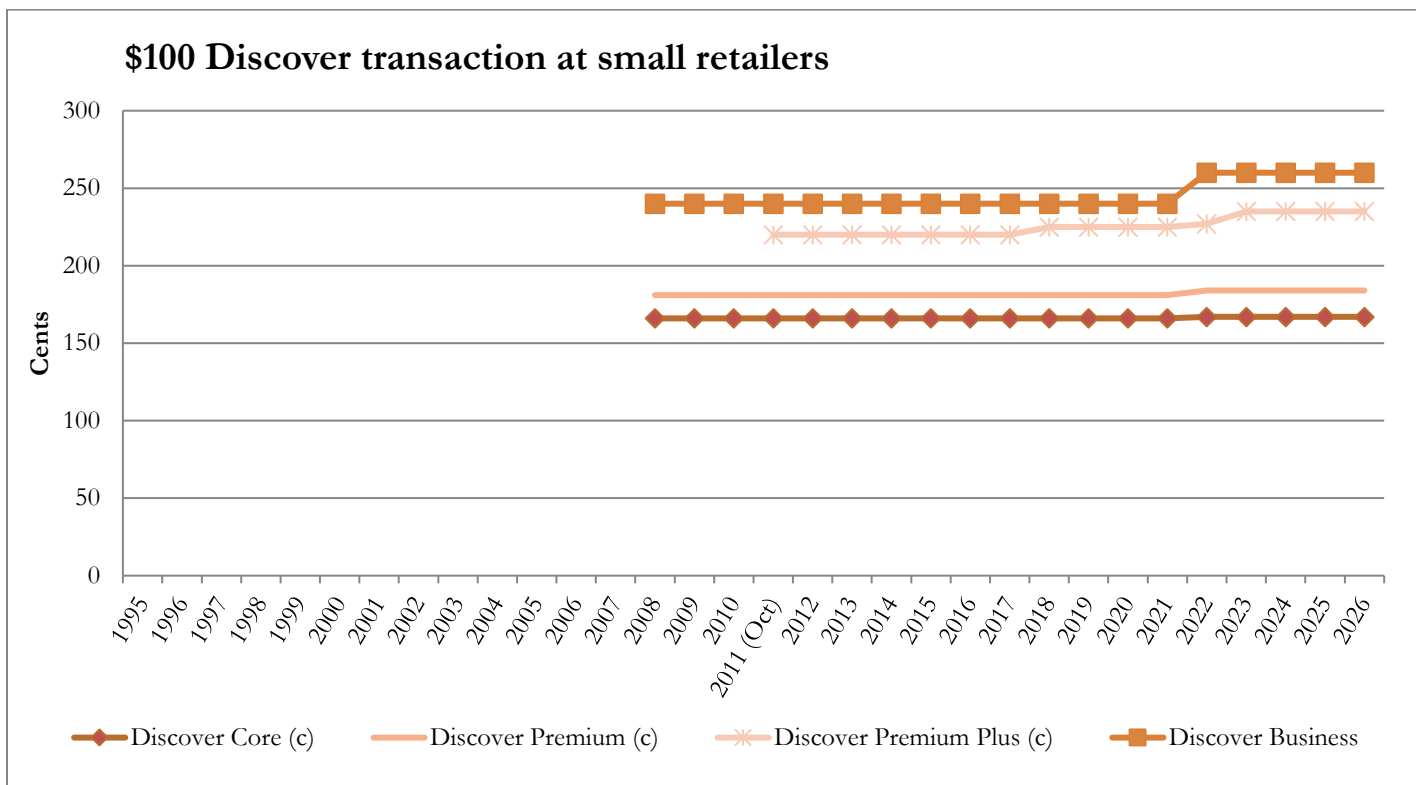
\$100 MasterCard transaction at small retailers
