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RENOVATED MONEY MUSEUM NOW OPEN IN DOWNTOWN DENVER

Redesign offers free, interactive exhibits for all ages

KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI – The Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City today announced that the newly renovated Denver Money Museum is now open to the public. Visitors can interact with a dozen, new exhibits on the first floor of the Denver branch office, located on the 16th Street Mall. Admission is still free.

“For more than 100 years, we’ve been proud to be part of the Denver community. We realize our central location provides a unique opportunity for visitors to learn about functions of the Federal Reserve and our role in the economy,” said Alison Felix, Vice President and Denver Branch Executive. “The new displays will increase visitor engagement and further enhance the guest experience.”

The Denver Money Museum is the most visited Money Museum in the entire Federal Reserve System and averaged 60,000 visitors in 2017. New features to the museum include:

- Money personality quiz
- Budget, saving and credit fitness interactive walls
- Job and income display
- Redesigned counterfeit exhibit, where guests can touch and smell currency

Visitors will still be able to see a display of \$30 million in cash, view historic currency, such as a \$100,000 bill, and receive a free, souvenir bag of shredded money.

The Money Museum is located at 1020 16th Street. Hours are 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding Bank holidays. The Money Museum is a self-guided experience and walk-ins are welcome. A government I.D. is required for visitors 18 and older. Visit kansascityfed.org for more information.
